Description of Incident:

- Ambush Shooting of Corporal Bryon Dixon and Trooper Alex Douglass at the Blooming Grove Station on 9/12/14
- Corporal Dixon passed away at the scene
- Trooper Douglass severely wounded and removed for treatment
- Troopers and PCO's secured the facility and needed to be extricated
- Shooter not in custody
- Wide perimeters established around station

Priorities and Challenges of Investigation and Search:

- Initial life safety issues of personnel and security of scene
- Manage large number of personnel and resources responding
- Initiate criminal investigation to determine what happened and identify actor(s)
- Safety of responding officers protective equipment not adequate for threat
- Needed to keep Frein focused on law enforcement not civilians
- Management of search 350 square miles of difficult terrain in 2 counties with concern about a possible additional ambush
- Critical to keep community fully informed regular news briefings and discussions with government and school officials
- Search lasted 48 days

Major Search Areas:

- Station and immediate area
- Area around Frein's Jeep
- Frein residence
- Cell phone ping/campsite/reported sightings

Impacts:

- Blooming Grove Station closed police services provided from PSP Honesdale
- Several schools closed
- Schools that remained open did not allow outdoor recess, cancelled after-school activities and changed bus routes to avoid search areas
- Businesses affected: tourism dramatically decreased; little or no activity for businesses
 within search or adjacent areas
- Hunting affected state game lands closed in Pike and Monroe Counties
- Residents in fear, entire neighborhoods were inconvenienced: Dealt with secure
 zones/road closures, police vehicles and armored vehicles in their neighborhoods, heavily
 armed police officers walking through their yards, helicopters searching overhead
- Affected staffing of all PSP facilities statewide: concern about possible additional attack,
 as well as need to send significant number of personnel to assist with the search

Resources:

- Nearly every operational component of the Pennsylvania State Police
- State Police from NY, NJ, CT, VA and MD
- State agencies: DCNR, Game Commission, Fish and Boat Commission, PEMA, OAG and DOC
- Federal agencies: FBI, BATF, US Marshals, US Customs and Border Patrol
- Numerous municipal police departments and sheriffs' offices
- Fire Department and EMS resources within Pike and Monroe Counties
- Pike and Monroe County Sheriffs, EMA, DOC and other resources
- Township resources within Pike and Monroe Counties
- Use of highly specialized and sophisticated equipment from state and federal agencies

Costs:

- PSP Overtime
- PSP Operational Costs
- Outside federal, state and local law enforcement agencies' expenses
- Pike/Monroe County and Municipal expenses

Issues:

- Deputizing out-of-state agencies with law enforcement powers
- Radio Communications coverage and interoperability
- Lack of funding source for agencies assisting PSP
- Challenge of coordinating large numbers of personnel from multiple agencies over a large geographic area
- Breakdown in communications at times with resources spread over a wide area with different reporting locations
- Rising costs of sustaining the operation

Positives:

- Frein was captured
- No loss of civilian lives
- No additional loss of law enforcement
- Thorough investigation resulting in successful prosecution
- Agencies worked well together and for an extended period of time
- Continued support of community throughout incident businesses, residents, Red Cross,
 Barrett Twp Fire Dept
- Return of sense of normalcy to community

Lessons Learned:

- Good media relationships are vital
- Reinforced use of Incident Management Teams
- Communications issues have to be addressed before next serious incident
- Station security practices reviewed
- Not all attacks can be prevented
- Ongoing examination of equipment purchases to enhance officer safety
- Keep operational command centralized for all agencies
