

It is my privilege to be here this morning to represent the 1800 members of the Pennsylvania Wing Civil Air Patrol, the US Air Force Auxiliary and Total Force partner in service to our communities, state and nation. I am Col Gary Fleming the Pennsylvania Wing Commander, this is Lt Col Kevin Berry Wing Vice Commander, and we have a number of our members here with us today. Thank you for affording me the opportunity provide information about our all Volunteer service to the Commonwealth and its Citizens.



First up a is short video that tracks Civil Air Patrol operations since inception and through today.



CAP has three main missions: Aerospace Education, Cadet Programs and Emergency Services. Our mission briefing begins with Aerospace Education.



The focus of Civil Air Patrol's Aerospace Mission is on STEM – Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. Our internal and external Aerospace Education programs, for our members and the community, are built around a STEM-based curriculum, with a strong emphasis on things that fly!



One great example of PAWG STEM activities is our Clarion Composite Squadron's STEM Fair, held last year at the Clarion County Airport. Cadets of SQ 504, with the support and encouragement of their senior members, planned, promoted and executed an AMAZING STEM activity for themselves and their community. The event was so popular that parking space was scarce at the airport! Hundreds of people from the community attended and enjoyed learning about physics, robotics, cyber security, drones, aircraft and of course, flying! The Squadron Commander attributes empowering the cadets to make this STEM Fair their own as the biggest key to its success!



Civil Air Patrol also has a wonderful selection of **FREE** STEM kits available to its members. This shows just a portion of the 15 STEM Kits now offered through a CAP grant program. Aerospace Education Officers at the Squadron, Group and Wing levels may order these kits for use in their lessons and events. Others, such as teachers and informal youth educators like Scout or youth group leaders, may join Civil Air Patrol as an Aerospace Education Member and receive these free kits, along with a wide range of other educational materials!

STEM kits are designed to enhance the CAP Aerospace Education curriculum and foster interest in diverse STEM areas. They arrive ready for learning and fun, right out of the box! The hands-on experience of building these kits, combined with conceptual learning, reinforces STEM topics learning, making it educational, fun and exciting!



Civil Air Patrol Cadets from across the nation, and here in Pennsylvania, participate in a timely technological initiative aimed at defending our nation against Cyber Attack: the Air Force Association's CyberPatriot Program. This National Youth Cyber Defense Competition educates and challenges our youth to become patriotic defenders of our nation's cyber-security and technological infrastructure. This competitive and highly technological program helps train a new generation of Americans to defend our nation in cyberspace. Pennsylvania Wing Cadet CyberPatriot teams from several Squadrons received regional recognition for their participation and success in the CyberPatriot program!



CAP's second mission area is Operations; this encompasses the areas of Emergency Services, Search & Rescue and Disaster Relief. OPS also manages Emergency Services training and Standards and Evaluation for our pilots. Lt Col Kevin Berry, Vice Commander, and himself a mission pilot will brief you on Pennsylvania Wing Operations.



The members of Civil Air Patrol, including those in PAWG, provide a wide array of Emergency support services; and what began as a Homeland Security organization in 1941 remains on task for that, and many more missions nearly 76 years later. This is the "short list" of what we can do through our volunteer service, and the many federally funded assets and individual expertise we bring to bear on our missions.



PA Wing has 12 CAP planes, all single engine Cessnas, based across state; each plane has the range to fly anywhere in state from its base on a single. Multiple, strategic base locations aid in reducing time to "target" and help maximize loiter times for missions requiring a sustained aerial presence.



Our qualified Ground team members position PAWG to be a force multiplier, capable of putting boots on the ground in support of many ES activities; the teams are self-transporting, arrive trained, equipped and self-sustaining for up to 72 hours afield; they bring specialized equipment including: dedicated CAP communications, radio direction-finders, first aid and patient transport gear and much more.



CAP communicators provide short, medium and long range communications with a variety of robust COM gear; CAP communicators maintain skills with frequent nets and exercises. Of note, PAWG communicators passed mission traffic in and out of Puerto Rico Wing in advance of Hurricane Maria and in the immediate wake of that devastating storm. On Thursday, PAWG communicators participated in a DoD short-notice exercise that tested CAP's ability to communicate nationwide during a simulated failure of commercial communications. Our members proved they could pass formal message traffic to communicate tasking for mission command and control.



We just completed our biennial Search and Rescue Evaluation YESTERDAY! This functional, performance-based test of our operational Emergency Services capabilities is conducted by the US Air Force. CAP-USAF, the Air Force organization responsible for ensuring that CAP is organized, trained, and equipped to fulfill the Air Force-assigned missions conducts this SAR/EVAL every other year. [Col Berry] piloted aerial imaging missions yesterday, while [Co Fleming] worked with our Incident Commanders and mission staff at PA Wing headquarters, Fort Indiantown Gap. More than 70 members Wing-wide participated in our SAR/EVAL, bringing dozens of different ES Specialty Qualifications to bear on the mission: pilots, air crew, ground teams, communicators, Incident Commander, Section Chiefts and mission base staff examples of the roles played by our all volunteer force to insure our ongoing our mission success!



Physical assets are the tools employed by our members who've attained Emergency Services Specialty Qualifications that comply with Nationally Recognized Standards.



Examples of Air Force Assigned Missions are aerial imaging, in this case of ice jams on the Susquehanna river.



Civil Air Patrol is engage in a Nationwide Homeland Security mission to train and exercise National Guard fighters for aircraft intercept missions.



[Col Berry] We are the "Track of Interest" for these missions...I prefer to think of it as being the "bad guys." Fighters scramble from the 177<sup>th</sup> AW Atlantic City and are generally on top of us in about 10 minutes. This is a photo taken from one of our planes being intercepted by a NJ ANG F-16 fighter; the mission route begins in Elk county and progresses through Clearfield, Center, Mifflin and Snyder counties. This is some of the most exciting CAP flying I do! The F-16s ALWAYS win, but I love being "fighter bait." All fun aside, this is a SERIOUS training mission for the Air Force and National Guard pilots who protect the skies of our Homeland!



Pennsylvania Wing is on the verge of being able to deploy Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems or drones on operational missions! Our people are trained and ready to go, we're simply awaiting the "flight release" from NHQ. We envision a wide range of applications for the capable little flying machines that include aerial imaging, thermal imaging, communications and Search and Rescue. On a National level, CAP is developing an sUAS "threat" mission, where our drones assist military bases' in developing, testing and training their drone defenses.



Today's CAP Senior members have the opportunity to learn and grow their leadership skill through 5 Levels of CAP Professional Development. Training begins with a CAP orientation course and progresses through technical, management, command and executive training. There are many additional specialized schools and training opportunities to support Senior members' training in their chosen specialty tracks.



Required and advanced training for our Senior members helps standardize our volunteer service and raise it to professional standards.



There's something for everyone in CAP and these are just the general categories for Senior member Specialty Track service to our organization. Members often join because they possess a skill a unit needs. Other times, our volunteers join to learn, grow and serve in ways that differ completely from their day-to-day work and lives.



Pennsylvania Wing Cadet Training schools holds Winter and Summer sessions for youth development. The weekend long winter schools are in the State College area 15-17 March, and summer schools at Fort Indiantown Gap 16-23 June. CTS schools include: Basic Cadet Encampment, Leadership Development Course, Region Cadet Leadership School and PA Wing's exclusive STEM Academy now entering it's fourth year! This is a short video form our summer schools.



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There are four key elements or "pillars" supporting the CAP Cadet Program: Leadership Education and Implementation, Aerospace Education, Character Development with classes conducted by Chaplains at units that have them, and CAP-trained Character Development Officers elsewhere. Topic in CD classes range from discussions of current events, decision making, work and interpersonal relationships all centered around our core values of Integrity, Respect, Excellence and Volunteer Service. Physical Fitness encourages healthy practices with regard to nutrition and exercise, while avoiding behaviors that put health at risk. These "pillars" support a comprehensive program designed to foster good citizenship, good health and serve to train and inspire the future leaders of America.



Cadets progress through achievements that include education and training in the four 'Pillars' combined with experiential learning; they're required to employ what they've learned! In the learning phase, cadets are taught what it means to be a CAP cadet, and about the opportunities and responsibilities that come along with that status. They learn self-leadership, customs and courtesies, wear of the uniforms and what it means to be a valued member of a unit. In the leadership phase cadets gradually take more responsibility for leading others, becoming element leaders, flight sergeants and first sergeants. In the command phase, cadets become responsible for their own units as flight commanders, executive officers and cadets Squadron Commanders. Those cadet who continue to achieve enter the Executive Phase and work with Senior Leadership as mentors, and take responsibility unit strategic planning and often participate in similar activities at the Wing, Region and National levels. Unlike many youth programs, CAP Cadets are responsible for administering this program. Senior members, adults, mentor the cadets and make certain they're performing well and according to CAPR. But for the most part, they do an outstanding job of running our Squadrons, and training their replacments!



Cadet achievements bear the names of notable figures from military and aviation history. For example: the Hap Arnold award for C/A1C. The Charles Lindbergh Award and C/MSgt.



At the end of each of the four phases in the Cadet Achievement pathway, there are four Milestone Awards marking the successful completion of each phase; Wright Brothers – C/Ssgt and the end of the Learning Phase. The Billy Mitchell Award, where cadets transition from Cadet NCO to Cadet Officer between the Leadership and Command Phases. The Ira Eaker Award denotes the successful completion of all achievments of the CAP cadet program. The Gen Carl Spaatz D is Civil Air Patrol's highest cadet honor. It is presented to cadets who have demonstrated excellence in leadership, character, fitness, and aerospace education. and corresponds to the rank of C/Col. Throughout this achievement series Cadets develop self-discipline, a strong sense of personal responsibility, the ability to lead and persuade, and a strong foundation for pursuing any career field, and especially one in aviation, space, science and technology.



And cadets do it all with great pride; in their own achievements, those of their fellow cadets and in the accomplishments of their units.



They learn first-hand, if you want to go far, you must go together!



Teamwork.



Unity...



Camaraderie! These are hallmarks of the CAP Cadet Program and all critical elements in Cadet Leadership development. Our young women and young men live what they learn! They grow in stature, maturity and leadership; through it all they form fantastic relationships with their fellow cadets in PA, and across the nation; many of those relationships last a lifetime! (And more than a few have resulted in marriages, that produce a new generation of cadets! How's that for retention & recruiting?!)



[Col Berry] In addition to supporting the Cadet program from the Senior side, I've had a front row seat for the wonderful contributions it's made to on one young woman's development as a parent of a cadet. She's develop as a leader, and in many other positive ways. This is me as SQ CC swearing in our daughter Ceara as a CAP Cadet just a few days after her 12<sup>th</sup> birthday. It earned her the unfortunate nickname of "Baby Berry" which she embraced and then grew out of quickly by charging hard and participating to the fullest. Here's just a sample of the many things she's done during her cadet career: And thanks to all she learned and did in CAP, she received CAP's appointment to the Air Force Academy Preparatory school in 2017 and is a Cadet Fourth Class at our United States Air Force Academy today! She wants to be a fighter pilot and the sky's the limit for her thanks in large part to her CAP Cadet career!



That's just one cadet's story. There are currently about 900 cadets in PAWG; over 25,000 nationwide.



And all this effort produces cadets who know where they've come from...



Know where they're going...


Are serious and focused when needs dictate...



And can smile and enjoy THEIR service when time allows...



And most all derive a great sense of satisfaction from all of this!



General Carrelli, refers to PA Wing as "Part of Pennsylvania's Air Force" which is at one humbling and motivating for our members. He also says, 'It takes a thousand people to put a pilot over the target.' In PAWG we've got about a thousand cadets. And we also have a thousand Seniors who do the best they can to provide fantastic training for our young people. Fortunately, we don't do it alone; we get a lot of support from our communities, the General Assembly and many other organizations. And we're especially thankful for the support we get from 19,000 Pennsylvania Guardsmen, who help shape our cadets' future more than many will ever know!



CAP Cadets and Seniors see a lot, do a lot and learn a lot...and they get to serve and hang out with some really cool people throughout their service. So that's the CAP Leadership story in a nutshell. Of course there's a lot more to it!

Once you're in, keep you so long as you're in the General Assembly; and you don't have to re-apply once you're a member.



Thanks to the perennial support of the General Assembly, and especially that of the VA&EP Committee Chairs and members, the members of Pennsylvania Wing benefit greatly from the support of the Commonwealth, through its generous state appropriation. And as Commander, on behalf of all our members, THANK YOU! It is very gratifying to have so many good friends and members here at the Capitol. Your support enables us to serve better, to serve well and to do more and more each year!



Last year, PAWG invested nearly EIGHTY PERCENT of our \$100,000 state appropriation on training. 4% helped pay for travel for management, administration, inspections and attending events across the Wing. The 8% spent on utilities helps "keep the lights" on at our Wing Headquarters, paying for phones and internet service and facilities expenses such as hangars, repeater sites, and Hawk Mountain Ranger School. The final 8% paid for essentials like stationery, printing, postage, cleaning supplies and the like.

The bill was reported as committed at the Senate VA&EP's first meeting, Sen Regan's and Sen Williams' first as Chairs, on 29 JAN and is re-referred to Appropriations. On behalf of the members of PA Wing, I appreciate all the support for this legislation to date and look forward to its being sent to the Governor for his signature this session. THANK YOU!
